From The Dog House

Behavior Training From A Dog's Point of View

Misbehavior is the number one reason people relinquish their animals to shelters. But, most of us dogs can easily learn the basic commands such as sit, stay, down, come and heel. All it takes is the same thing it takes to raise well-behaved children: consistency, structure and lots of positive reinforcement.

Contrary to popular opinion, you definitely can teach an old dog new tricks. Many behavior problems are created by you humans. For example, if you keep us isolated on a chain, in a crate or in a garage we're going to be lonely, frustrated and unhappy since we dogs are very social animals and crave human interaction. So depriving any dog of this basic need will result in bad behavior.

Remember, we dogs feel the same emotions you humans do-fear, loneliness, boredom, anxiety and joy. And just like a child, we thrive on structure. So establish a daily routine for us to walk, eat, play and sleep. The more consistent you are, the more confident and obedient we will be.

Participating in a basic daily grooming ritual allows us to become comfortable with good touches. It also gives you the opportunity to check us for lumps and bumps that may require medical attention.

If we are not exercised enough we can

develop behavioral difficulties. So try to take us on long walks in your neighborhood, to the park or even to the beach. Play ball with us in the backyard. A dog who is loved, exercised, and receives lots of positive social interaction is going to be a happy dog.

We also enjoy mental stimulation, so consider buying a Kong toy and filling it with treats. Our mom hides treats around the house and then directs us to find them. This exercises our brains and it's a lot of fun.

Make sure you establish leadership and give sincere praise when we do something good. Encourage acceptable behavior by using positive reinforcement and discourage negative behavior such as nipping, biting and jumping.

Never hit or strike us. This only makes us fearful and possibly aggressive. We hate agitating noises, so try shaking a can with a few coins inside to show us when our behavior has a negative impersonal consequence. Some of us dogs are easier to train than others, but most of us really want to please our human pack leader and we are willing and able to learn. Good training does not include jerking our neck while walking, or rubbing our nose in our waste when we have an accident in the house. Those are old fashioned and ineffective methods of discipline. The more time you initially spend train-

ing us, the more likely you are to have a well-

behaved life-long companion. You will be able to enjoy us more, and we will be welcomed in many different places. If you have a busy schedule, take us with you as often as possible, such as when you drop your kids off at school, get money from the ATM or stop at a drive-through restaurant. This gives you more time to spend with us and is fun for us, as well. Enroll us in a basic training class.

Places like PetSmart, and local humane societies offer low cost training. You can also consider private trainers who often come to your house. You can even learn some great techniques by watching the Dog Whisperer on television. And remember to get your animal spayed or neutered. It helps reduce aggression especially in males, and it provides health benefits. In addition, unaltered animals often escape from homes and yards when the female is in heat. In the process, your pet may become lost or seriously injured.

Sit, Stay, Down, Come and Heel. My mom trained both of us to be great dogs. You, too, can have a great dog if you put forth the time and effort



Make That Gas Last

Gas prices may have come down a penny or two recently but not enough to make us jump with joy. Ron Hollenbeck, the coauthor of *The Gas Mileage Bible*, has a few tips on how to make your fill-ups go farther.

- Lose Some Pounds—Take every bit of clutter out of your trunk until you need it.
 Gauge says that for every 100 pounds of extra weight your car hauls, you lose one to two percent of your fuel mileage.
- Keep It Steady—When driving, imagine there's an egg between your foot and the accelerator. "If you press too hard, you're

going to break the egg and get bad gas mileage," says Hollenbeck. **Gauge says** drivers who jackrabbit start and then jam on the brakes get 37 percent worse gas mileage than those who maintain a consistent speed.

- Tune It Up. Ask your mechanic to change the air filters and test the oxygen sensor.
 Gauge says cars more than a year old can lose as much as 40 percent gas efficiency when they go untuned.
- Check Your Cap. As temperatures climb, gas evaporation increases, creating pressure inside your fuel tank. If your gas cap has a

less than airtight seal, the pressure will force out precious fumes. **Gauge says** the average car loses about 30 gallons of gas a year due to evaporation. (Multiply that by the price per gallon of gas!)

Project Lifesaver

Electronic Technology to Locate Missing Persons

You read about it too often. A child with autism or Down syndrome wanders away and is "rescued" by a predator. A 60 year old adult with Alzheimer's becomes lost and disoriented. A beloved nana leaves home in the middle of the night. Tragically, these and other people in similar situations could have been rescued within an average of 22 minutes. Their families or caregivers could have had the reassurance these victims would be found, returned quickly and safely. All each needed was a bracelet. A special bracelet.

For two years, The Alzheimer's Family Center, in partnership with the Broward's Sheriff's Office, have been working in our area to start the program "Project Lifesaver," a public safety program that locates missing persons who suffer from disorders that cause them to wander. The pilot program recently began with 50 people who live in Margate, Tamarac, Lauderdale Lakes and Pompano Beach.

A bracelet is attached to the wrist or ankle of the individual. If the person wanders or gets lost, the Sheriff's office is noti-

fied and an officer can locate the individual with a tracking device similar to the Lo Jack car system. Bracelet batteries are changed monthly by a trained volunteer who goes to each individual's home.

Project Lifesaver International, Inc., established in 1999, is a not-for-profit organization that serves sheriff, police, fire, public safety and search and rescue teams nationwide. The program is endorsed by National and International Organizations. So far it has been established in over 400 communities in 42 states. It is volunteered staffed seven days a week, and volunteers assist in all aspects.

I attended the volunteer's training program two weeks ago, and was impressed by the simplicity of the program. As a volunteer, I'll be spending about one hour a month changing batteries on bracelets that are a permanent "fashion accessory."

So far, the recovery rate of "victims" is 100%. Is there a better percentage than that?

We should add Coconut Creek's name to the list of participants as soon as the program opens. We're very foolish if we don't because it means we don't care enough to save the lives of our at-risk loved ones when

we easily could. However, politics rears it's ugly face even now, even before this program is available to us. For the bottom line is that cities have to participate. They have to sign up or their residents cannot reap the benefits of having a reciprocal arrangement with another town or city who is part of the Program





National Grandparents Day

By the President of the United States of America

A Proclamation

As we seek to strengthen the enduring values of the family, it is appropriate that we honor our grandparents.

Grandparents are our continuing tie to the near past, to the events and beliefs and experiences that so strongly affect our lives and the world around us. Whether they are our own or surrogate grandparents who fill some of the gaps in our mobile society, our senior generation also provides our society a link to our national heritage and traditions.

We all know grandparents whose values transcend passing fads and pres sures, and who possess the wisdom of distilled pain and joy. Because they are usually free to love and guide and befriend the young without having to take daily responsibility for them, they can often reach out past pride and fear of failure and close the space between generations.

The Congress, by joint resolution (H.) Res. 244 has authorized and requested the President to designate the First Sunday of September following Labor Day of each year as National Grandparents Day.

NOW. THEREFORE, I, JIMMY CARTER, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Sunday, September 9, 1979 and the first Sunday following Labor Day in each succeeding year as "National Grandparents Day." I urge officials of Government at the national, State, and local levels, and of voluntary organizations to plan appropriate activities that recognize the importance and the worth of the 17 million grandparents in our nation. I urge all Americans to take the time to honor their own grandparents or those in their community.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this sixth day of September, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy nine, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and fourth.

I had to get up at 4 AM every morning. On Saturday, I had to collect the 42 cents from my customers. My favorite customers were the ones who gave me 50 cents and told me to keep the change. My least favorite customers were the ones who seemed to never be home on collection day. Movie stars kissed with their mouths shut. At least, they did in the movies. Touching someone else's tongue with yours was called French kissing and they didn't do that in movies. I don't know what they did in French movies. French movies were dirty and we weren't allowed to see them.

If you grew up in a generation before there was fast food, you may want to share some of these memories with your children or grandchildren. Just don't blame me if they bust a gut laughing. Growing up isn't what it used to be, is it?

I knew it as the bottle that sat on the end of the ironing board and used to "sprinkle" clothes because we didn't have steam irons. Man, I am old.
